WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING IN MY HIVES THIS MONTH??

How do I handle this warm/ cold March weather? The Warmer temperatures we have seen in February have the dandelions, henbit & red maple blooming early this year. Queens are busy laying & colonies are already building up fast. Beekeepers have already had their beehives boiling & in desperate need of extra room. In early Spring, seeing drones in your colonies is an indicator the 2023 reproductive cycle has begun. Swarms are already being caught &

your bees may be busy capping swarm cells as our honey bees follow their natural instincts -- this early in the year! Monitor your colonies & carefully look for swarm cells. There's a tight line between maintaining a large colony for honey production vs it swarming on you & ending your honey extraction dreams. Do not act too fast to split a hive, this cold weather could be detrimental to a small unprepared colony. Look into vertical splits and double screen boards if you are capturing a swarm. Learning how to manage, prevent & capture swarms and handling splits is VERY important information for even experienced beekeepers; and new beekeepers will benefit from having this valuable info in their beekeeping arsenal for their own Spring 2024 build-up.


One medium & one deep are available, so everyone can play regardless of your choice of equipment!
